

Joint Seabasing:

The United States faces a complex mix of hybrid threats manifest in states who sponsor terrorism, regional and rising peer competitors, failing states that undermine regional stability, and a variety of violent non-state actors — all serving to destabilize legitimate governments and undermine the security and stability of the greater global community. Joint Seabasing enables us to better meet these challenges through maximized forward presence and security cooperation by creating a port and airfield capability at sea for joint force packaging, projection, and protection. Seabasing enables us to optimize our footprint ashore with relevant populations and avoid the unintended political, social, and economic disruptions that often result from a large American presence. Joint Seabasing provides the combatant commanders the capability to rapidly access and influence priority areas with tailored, flexible, and sustainable joint forces that can quickly adapt to missions across the range of military operations.
